This two-session workshop will focus on the two components of winning a strong contract: 1) a focused bargaining team, and 2) a contract campaign that runs alongside negotiations. The first session will educate participants about the basics of bargaining, how to put together an effective negotiating team, things to think about before drafting proposals, and how to ensure the bargaining process is as democratic and inclusive as possible. The second session will focus on how to plan and implement a contract campaign that places pressure on the employer through escalating actions in order to move negotiations. *Presenter: Dr. Dawn Tefft*

One Conference Membership Processing

This in-depth look at the membership processing function starts with the basic requirements in the IEA Bylaws and other documents that set forth the parameters and responsibilities of enrolling and tracking all IEA members. This includes changes to the way in which IEA dues are assessed for new and continuing members. Finally, you'll get a detailed look at the functions that the local membership chair is responsible for, including a walk-through of the online enrollment platform, as well as an in-depth training on the electronic billing platform used to download reports and update member information, view monthly billing statements, current IEA balances and pay your local's IEA bills electronically. IEA-Retired Sessions

A Brief History of Native Americans into Illinois

Gerald's formal native name is Ho-Chunk Ska Ga (White Winnebago) is a tribal elder with the Ho-Chunk Nation. He will discuss the reintroduction of his family into the Illinois, tribal customs and ways, the history of the tribe, modern natives, naming ceremonies, stereotypes, environmental concerns, tribal settlements and reservations.

Gerald's grandparents were Chief Walks with the Wind and Princess Stands on a Cloud. They were very influential in teaching Gerald native customs and ways. He carries on his grandfather's tradition of teaching people about their tribal ways. His program is about the history, past and present, from a Native perspective. Gerald was a union bargaining negotiator as well as a school board member, beekeeper, HS umpire, Illinois Humanities Road Scholar and speaker currently. Presenter: Gerald Savage

Combatting Disinformation

Microaggressions: Death by a Thousand Paper Cuts

The old adage, "Sticks and stones can break my bones, but names can never hurt me," is a fallacy. The truth is, implicit bias refers to attitudes and beliefs that unconsciously impact our decisions and actions. These ingrained biases then manifest themselves and are reflected in the form's of microaggressions that are insidious, hurtful, and create a psychic toll on anybody experiencing them. Stereotypes that are prevalent in diverse classrooms can negatively impact student behaviors and academic outcomes. This workshop will discuss and share real-life examples of microaggressions and stereotypes. Participants will have an opportunity to explore practical strategies to confront implicit bias within themselves and others.

Using Gmail to Connect with Members

Gmail is a very powerful tool that can be leveraged to connect your members with what is happening in your local. In this session we'll break down all the basics, so you are ready to communicate like a pro! Learn how to switch between Google accounts to ensure you're doing your union work on personal accounts, how to draft an email and the various features you can use inside a message, schedule and send your message so that it arrives at just the right time, create a contact and apply a label to quickly send a message to a group, use email best practices to dodge the spam filters, and learn how IEA can help via the Communication Tool Request form. Compensation Models and Salary Schedules for Education Support Professionals

P-12 School Districts and Higher Education institutions all have unique ways of compensating employees. We will discuss common strategies for increasing salaries for Education Support Professionals, including common percentages or dollar amounts, salary schedules, and longevity programs. We will highlight current trends in ESP compensation in Illinois and the impact of recent legislative action aimed at increasing salaries for ESPs. Members will learn the major considerations for developing a new salary schedule and how IEA can support bargaining teams in costing out compensation proposals. Contract Law Basics

Whether you are negotiating a conference room space for your local, purchasing a product for yourself or your local, it is important to know the basics of contract law. In this training we will provide a brief overview of the law of contracts including what makes a valid contract and how to avoid typical contract errors. We will also share basic negotiation strategies and practice our skills negotiating a simple purchase agreement contract. In this workshop we will discuss how emotions impact the bargaining process and how to work with difficult personalities. We will share techniques one can implement prior to the bargaining process to help create a positive bargaining environment. Health Insurance: Navigating and Negotiating the Financial Dilemma

Health insurance costs are driving all financials at the bargaining table. Local IEA affiliates are struggling to meet the increased demands to provide quality health insurance, at the same time, reduce the financial burden on their members. Preparing to Bargain Finances: Considerations for Education Support Professionals

Members will learn how to maximize IEA bargaining resources, the timeline for finance trainings in the upcoming year, and the district documents you will need to request in order to complete a financial analysis. Noel Candelaria, a special education teacher and former teacher's aide from El Paso, Texas, is secretary-treasurer of the National Education Association, the nation's largest professional organization. Noel ranks third among the Association's leadership team. His primary responsibility is managing and maintaining the Association's multimillion dollar budget.

Noel is the first-generation son of Mexican immigrants who instilled within him the value of a quality public education. As a result, Noel learned firsthand about the transformative power of public education, how the influence of one educator knows no limits, and that when woven together the two form a direct pathway toward the American Dream.

Elected amid the COVID-19 pandemic and the economic crisis that it created, Noel is the former president of the Texas State Teachers Association (TSTA). Before that, Noel served three years as TSTA vice president, which followed a distinguished tenure as president of the Ysleta Teachers Association (YTA) in El Paso, Texas, where he worked in the Ysleta Independent School District (YISD), teaching subjects ranging from Algebra to World History.

Noel has also held leadership positions at the National Council of State Education Associations, NEA Member Benefits and the National Teacher Hall of Fame (NTHF). During Noel's leadership as chair of the Memorial to Fallen Educators, located in Emporia, Kansas, legislation was passed to designate the monument as a national memorial site. Noel has also served on numerous national committees and task forces, including the NEA Human and Civil Rights Committee.

A tireless advocate for educators and students—who is often joined in his activist work by his wife Patty, a National Board Certified Teacher—Noel believes in the value and power of relationships that are based on trust, whether they are formed in the classroom, the community or the halls of political power. Noel relies on those relationships—at the local, state, and national levels—to keep the doors of success open and accessible to all students.

Noel is a dynamic and energetic speaker who is frequently asked to speak about racial and social justice, classroom management, and creating high-quality Association leaders. He holds a bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies and education from the University of Texas at El Paso.
