UNDO TIER TWO

While IEA is very disappointed that a fix for Tier Two did not pass this session, we hold out hope that a solution will come soon. Please see IEA President Al Llorens' statement below:

"Together we've built a solid foundation in the fight to undo Tier 2. Thank you - all your conversations with lawmakers, rallies, calls and emails made a difference. Even though, we didn't pass our fixes to the Tier 2 pension system this legislative session, our efforts are far from over. We may be angry and frustrated, but we are not deterred. LEGISLATIVE WINS

- <u>Senate Bill 1799</u> In regard to outsourcing, this bill defines emergency, allows one-time use of outsourced district employees during an emergency and says any further use of outsourced employees must be agreed upon with the collective bargaining unit.
- House Bill 3309 Districts can share employee data lists of names, addresses and other information to the state labor organization.
- House Bill 3000 Employee IDs of those working in grades six through 12 have contact information for suicide prevention.
- <u>Senate Joint Resolution 2</u> Professional review panel study on special education resource teacher caseload of 28 students' impact on evidence-based funding.

STATE BUDGET

Illinois State Board of Education: Received at \$307 million increase in the evidence-based funding formula. Early childhood and the ISBE operating budget remained flat. There was a \$1.3 million increase in career and technical education. The Teacher Vacancy Grant Program was cut by \$15 million and will be funded at \$30 million. And, \$5 million was set aside for the state's virtual coaching and mentoring program, which helps teachers in their first few years of teaching.

Illinois Community College Board: \$4.5 million increase in two main funds. Vast majority of funding remained the same.

Illinois Board of Higher Education: Vast majority of funding remained flat.
